

3351. Julian Hill Whittlesey (Granville¹⁹³⁶), b. Oct. 27, 1905, Greenwich, CT; *He received degrees in civil engineering and architecture from Yale University in 1927 and 1930. Before beginning his architecture career, he received a fellowship to the American School of Classical Studies as an architectural surveyor in Athens, Greece. First drawn to problems of providing housing to the expanding population of the big cities, he became a consultant to the Resettlement Administration in the 1930s and later the US Public Housing Administration. With the outbreak of WWII, he designed housing and administrative space for the military. Mayer and Whittlesey, the firm he co-founded in 1935 with Albert Mayer, would become known for large apartment buildings. One of the most prominent being the Manhattan House, the glazed white-brick building between Second and Third Avenues and 65th and 66th Streets in New York City. The firm was also involved in the planning of the new cities of Kitimat, British Columbia, and Chandigarh, India. He was a partner in Architectural firm Gruzen and Partners, Newark, prominent City Planners and he was the first winner of the Andrew B. Thomas Award for pioneering architecture. In the 1950s, with establishment of Whittlesey, Conklin & Rossant, the firm that would become Whittlesey, Conklin & Echeverria, he became involved in the development of the planned community of Reston, VA. In 1960 he returned to his love of archaeology for a summer project in the Mediterranean and continued at this for the next 17 years and helped to develop new methods of underwater photography.* He was m.
